I've had several inquiries about non-resident trout fishing licenses. They are available from the local Chiloquin Hardware store and sell for:

1 day = \$8, 2 day = \$14.50, 3 day = \$21,

The local trout fishing is great, with 3 to 5 pounders from most local streams, 5 to 10 pounders in the fly fishing only Williamson, and 10 to 20 pounders from Agency Lake. All within minutes of Train Mountain.

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FROM THE MANAGER The latest from the General Manager

From the Manager, Ross Perrin:

It's getting close! You can feel the excitement around here. Everyone is talking about Train Meets and the Triennial and trying to prepare. Unfortunately we seem to be in a snow and rain pattern yet with temperatures far below normal which means things are slow going. What does this mean to us? It means that there will be a lot of last minute preparations for the Triennial. We do have a little water behind dams 1 and 2, which means we have a higher water table and the water will be with us a little longer.

In the past week the Kitsap Krew was able to get a few things done outside and a lot of projects inside were finished up. Even though the Idaho Mafia boss (Mark Flitton) and his right hand man (Rich Ledyard) thought they had to give them some encouragement by showing up a day before the Krew and setting the pace of things.

The Krew was able to complete most of the reconnections

to the steaming bays and the 3 unloading tracks, this involved some digging, hauling old material away, installing ties and steel connectors at the scissor lift ends, reconstructing the ties on the 3 way stub switches at the turntable and ballasting the connections. This was necessary due to removal for new electrical services in the steaming bays and for the outside lights. That was the big job. They also did things like making the rubber inserts for the couplers and installing them into the couplers, made switch number signs from steel stock for Crisp Yard, helped Ron move some buildings around, made more track gauges, made safety cable end brackets, replaced a cooling fan in the BN locomotive, put new batteries in a speeder, installed switch throw parts on many switches and seemed to do a lot of "operational tests" on trains, this was Dennis Weavers term. I think it was more like joy riding and Jerry Crane seemed to enjoy himself "train surfing", (that is my term, standing upright on the engineer car or other car while the car is moving).

Let us not forget the Idaho Team, even though Rich has no problem creating work for Mark they still accomplished a lot. Rich had most of the steel cut and ready for the Kitsap Krew to use for safety cables and track gauges by the time the Krew arrived. Mark and Rich also serviced and made many repairs to the BN. A lot of this work was detail/body work and they did a fine job. They even designed and installed a new headlight system in the locomotive.

Thanks to all the efforts of these 2 groups we are well on our way to a season of superb railroading. Thanks for all your help, Mark Flitton, Rich Ledyard, Dennis Weaver, Jerry Crane, Dick Peterson, And George Hayden. Your extra help is always appreciated. Trevor Heath and Janet Mayberry also spent a day with us; Trevor is working on some projects for the Internet and the Triennial. Thanks Trevor.

Our long-term volunteers are also arriving. Art Miller and Amy Winter, Peg and Charlie Schubert, and Jeff Phillips are all hard at work. Thanks to all of you.

We all need to remember safety. As the weather improves around here and more folks come to help we have a greater risk of a car versus person accident. Not only do we have a lot of people working on the grounds moving in and out of obscure areas raking etc. we also have a lot of mowers, gators and various other small vehicles using the roads. Please remember this and go slow and watch for these hazards. I feel that a 15 MPH speed is appropriate and in most cases anyone should be able to stop in short order.

I have had some inquiries as to food services during this season. Until proper repairs to the sewer system can be permitted and accomplished the Beanery will be closed. During this time we will have a local vendor selling light snacks and some fast food items during the first work week, during the first meet this service will be added to by another vendor as needed. During the triennial we will have three such vendors at Train Mountain and one of these will be doing a more complete menu to include a different dinner

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each night and Mexican dishes. During most workweeks and meets the snack bar at Klamath & Western will be open. The yard at K&W will handle lots of trains so you can park and dine or pick-up and travel along the rails while you dine.

I look forward to seeing all of you in the coming months. Don't forget to put your suggestions in the suggestion box while you are here or email me at your convenience. I use your input to make things better for all of us at Train Mountain.









Part of the Idaho Mafia turned up for the Kitsap week and Mark and Richard were having some 'issues', but I'm not sure 'they' were talking when they left!

TRIENNIAL PREPARATIONS The latest information for the Triennial

And now a word from our fearless leader, Mark Flitton:

Hello, all.

A couple of quick notes as we close in on the Triennial Meet. One is about safety when you arrive. Please put your vehicle in first gear and drive slowly. There are a lot of distractions at Train Mountain, and we need to avoid accidents. Pay particular attention to the crossings; there will be lots of trains!

The following is a quick list of required items for operating your train at Train Mountain along with a list of suggested items:

- Red flag for your conductor (available at the gift shop). REQUIRED.
- 2. CB or family band radios. REQUIRED.
- 3. Safety chains between equipment. REQUIRED.

- Boiler inspection certificate. REQUIRED. (Boiler inspectors available at TM.)
- Conductor for the back of your train. REQUIRED. (See rules on TM website for clarification on speeders.)
- 6. Flashlight (required for night running).
- 7. Headlight and taillight for your train (required for night running.)
- 8. Hat (available in gift shop).
- Warm clothing.
- 10. Sunglasses.
- 11. Insect repellant.
- 12. Camera and film.
- 13. Walking shoes.
- Gloves. (Remember, you are going to want to volunteer.)
- 15. Sun Blocker (we are at 4200 feet and the sun will get to you. Drink lots of fluids during the daylight hours).

A few other housekeeping items—first of all, we need one more boiler inspector. Please contact Cal Tinkham if you are interested. Also please make sure you review Rich Ledyard's article below on the shuttle vans. We need lots of volunteers for this service. It is a great way to meet our visitors and provide a much appreciated service.

Finally, I want to remind everyone that we will be having volunteer meetings each morning beginning the week before the meet. We will gather each morning to fill open positions on the volunteer schedule and discuss work assignments for the day. Once the meet starts, we will use the meeting to fill in our volunteer schedules; a representative from each committee will be at the morning meetings to sign you up. Even if you are only attending for a few days, we want your help. I know you will have fun!

The next Gazette should come out just before the Triennial; we will update you on the activities from the May meet and remind you one more time to VOLUNTEER!!

NEXT WORK WEEK What do we do next!

Tune up, fix up, spruce up, whatever you want to call it, that's what we need to do next. Our big project for 2003 is of course the Triennial meet. To put on such a meet requires that everything we currently have installed is in its proper working order. We have 13.42 miles of mainline track with over 600 switches to tune up, fix up, and spruce up. Please give us a hand at accomplishing these tasks. Also remember to plan enough time to have fun while you are here!

May Work Week Projects May 24th--June 1st, 2003

Tune Up, Fix Up, Spruce Up, Clean Up, Weed, Clean, etc.

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Possible July Work Week Projects

July 26th--August 3rd, 2003

Aspen Grove Loop - 5,200 plus feet—work crew (depending on rail)

Anytime Projects

Siding Extension - 2 people one day
Steuer siding, extend from 120 feet to 140 feet, install new switch.

Main Yard Tune up - 2 people two weeks

Six Acre Siding and Yard - 2 people 1 week

Six switches, one siding, four stubs.

North Portal Siding, Wye, and Yard - 4 people 1 week

Seven switches, two sidings, one wye, and one stub.

Grade Crossings Upgrade - 2 to 4 people 2 days each

Replace any wooden tie sections within two track sections of all grade crossings (this can be an ongoing project)

And of course there is the always popular, rake pine needles and pine cones fun and games!

WHAT WORKS

Ideas that seem to make a difference

The following ideas are from Trevor Heath who is coordinating all of the photo shoots going on during the Triennial. His past photo shoots are well known and were a lot of fun to participate in. ED.

On Tuesday June 24th of the Triennial meet, we will be attempting to create several more scene's like the one shown here and those featured recently in Live Steam Magazine, in on-line photo competitions, and even on post cards for sale in the Train Mountain store, monies from which benefit the railway.



A video clip was also taken where all three trains were moving. The whole thing was only possible thanks to the efforts of many, loco and equipment owners and helpers alike. We closed portions of the track to other traffic, and rehearsed the "take" several times

The clips and images are viewed by live steam enthusiasts from all over the world with the resultant publicity for the railway.

If you would like to participate as a loco owner, here is what we are looking for: Steam, Larger loco's able to haul significant consists. Even better two or more loco's and consists from the same railroad, for example, Chuck Hackett's UP Northern and passenger consist passing a UP Challenger on a long mixed consist of oil, box and cattle cars. Another possibility a Canadian Pacific Hudson on a train of refers passing a Canadian Pacific Mikado on a mixed.

We would also like to put together a really good 2.5" scale D&RGW narrow gage consist behind a K27, K28 or K36 and film it entering and exiting the wooden OTH tunnel. This one is not as difficult to film as the track is easily protected without inconveniencing others too much and could be done at another time during the week. Early morning is always good at this location the sun always seems to cooperate.

Diesel: Would need to be battery electric with sound systems. Similar consists and idea's but very interested in double, triple or even quad loco's hauling a consist just like we see out there every day. Another idea would be the Metrolink F59 and Bombardier cars owned by Cinthia Biros passing a large mixed freight.

If you would like to participate or Volunteer to help, or have an idea for a really authentic photo, just drop me a line to trevor@livesteaming.com or see me before the 24th.

During the Triennial we intend to photograph every loco and owner for historical record of participation. All of these photo's will be taken digitally and will most likely form a web page on the Train Mountain web site.

We would like to take two photos one of the loco from an angle which produces the most prototypical look possible and a second, more of a pose, with the loco owner or meet driver. If you would like to "spiff up" for your photo, just let us know and we will try to arrange a day and time.

We would like to take the photo's in the early morning and later afternoon when lighting is at its best in locations with suitable backgrounds. These will have been selected by the time the meeting starts.

It is hoped to download the efforts from each day onto a laptop and be able to project them in a slide show using a box light and PowerPoint software on to a suitable wall each evening at central station.

All photo's will be available by e-mail attachment in print quality size to the respective loco owners after the meeting.

RULES OF THE ROAD Reviewing the Rules

My favorite topic taken from the Rules of the Road, is the one about Speed! Since this is the first operating meet of 2003 it's a good time to remind us all of the need to maintain safe operating speeds while running at Train Mountain. With all of the new track since the last 'big one' and so many first timers coming to the 2003 Triennial, we all need to be on our best behavior and watch out for the other guy. Just because you know your way around doesn't mean 'they' do. 'They' may be watching the birds, the deer, the what ever and not necessarily the track. If we ALL keep our speeds under control and keep the two milepost distance between trains it will be another 'safe' train meet at Train Mountain.

- SEVEN MILES PER HOUR MAXIMUM SPEED EQUALS TEN SEC-ONDS BETWEEN MILEPOSTS. Exceptions are posted trackside.
- 210' MINIMUM SEPARATION BETWEEN TRAINS EQUALS TWO MILEPOST LENGTHS TO THE END OF THE NEXT TRAIN. The absence of signal blocks means that safety requires separation between trains.


Cheryl's engine is above and her completed train quilt is on the right. The Milwaukee Road would be proud of her craftsmanship, I like it!
