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Collectively, we can continue, "railroading for the young at heart"!!

So my buddy calls the other day and asks *'how's* the weather up there?' I reply, 'it's 3 o'clock'! He says 'no you old coot, not what time is it. I asked how's the weather?' I repeat my reply, 'it's 3 o'clock!' He say's 'OK what's up?' I said 'it's Chiloquin Oregon, at 3 o'clock on Monday it was 60 degrees, on Tuesday it was snowing, and Wednesday it was raining, on Thursday it was clear, windy, and 39 degrees!' So the answer about the weather up here is it's 3 o'clock! What has all this to do with Train Mountain? Well, Ross and crew are trying very hard to get projects started for this building season, and well, the weather is just not cooperating! Take for example trying to do dirt work. In the morning the ground is frozen, in the afternoon it's like a thick soup! The guys out doing the signal work on the north end of the property dress for working outdoors and by the time they get to the work area, it's all together different. My hat's off to them and their efforts. In spite of all this, they are making major progress. I actually saw working signals on my way out to the end of track! Great job gang! Speaking of signals, many folks coming for the Big One will be here for the first time. So for you 'old timers' please have a little patience with them as they try and filter through all of the different methods we use at Train Mountain. Our system can be as simple as the green blocks, which warn of a possible track condition, all the way up to approach signals that give you permission to proceed! During the Triennial there will be special information mail boxes located out on the new areas of right of way. Inside these mail boxes will be instructional information sheets that will be particular to the area where you are located. Upon returning from that area, there will be additional mail boxes to return the information sheets for others to use. There will also be a handout in the Triennial Registration Packet that will give you additional information. Bottom line though, is we are going to have to learn how to live with signaling, bi-directional running, and all the new and unfamiliar track. It will take patience and training and should be a lot of fun as well!

When you show up for any meet this year (or any time you can make it) PLEASE check the white board in the Hall of Flags at Central Station. Ross will be posting the many jobs that need to be done. Some of these will require a crew, but many more only require that someone takes on the task posted and gets it done. Dennis, John, Lee and I have done a good amount of running in the last few days and the track is actually in pretty good shape. The frost heaves have settled nicely. However the usual mounds of pine needles, pine cones, and branches are everywhere. Lots of raking and hauling needs to be done before the 'big show'. Dennis, John, Lee and myself will try and get the green blocks out for the areas that need additional attention. These areas show up as 3 basic areas of concern. Kinks, wiggles, and humps. Kinks can be generally fixed by bumping the track back into alignment and tamping the ballast to secure the track. Wiggles require the track tools

and mirrors to realign the track to grade. Wiggles are those areas where your train rocks back and forth from left to right and back again. Humps have all kinds of causes but mostly I have found they are caused by creeping root structures undermining the track. In several cases this requires removal of a section of track to get to the 'root' of the problem (sorry!). In any event, none of this is real hard work, it is just that with 30 miles of track there seems to be an endless supply of these areas! There will also be lot's of opportunities to participate in the new track building process and other projects like the 2 Percent solution and some additional rebuilding projects. PLEASE come and give us a hand before the 'big show'! Thanks.

The building wizards of Ron and Larry are nearing completion of a new passenger station and it's a real beauty! It's been a real treat to poke my head in the door every few days and watch this masterpiece take shape! It's really cool!

Next up is the Narrow Gauge Meet, but I have been forgetting to also mention the all important annual gathering of the Kitsap Clan that gets us going for the season. Since many of them are also some of the movers and shakers of the Narrow Gauge Meet, they will be arriving a bit early and having their annual festivities the week of the meet. It's like actually having a work week before the meet. I know they won't believe it but I am actually looking forward to their annual visit!

John Black is installing one of the many solar panels used to remotely power the signal system.

Project #2 on the Bot and will soon be a single story station with freight house.





If you look close you can see some of the details the Bot has routed into the siding. Using the Bot I am able to cut all the pieces in a day, then two days to paint all the parts and another two days to do the final assembly.
