If you are COURTEOUS and PA-TIENT, I'm confident that you will get through this check in with flying colors. I am also just as confident that if you create any grief for the Registration volunteers, your stay will start off poorly and will not be nearly as much fun as the rest of us 'patient' folks will be having! If you have any spare time during your visit, make sure you attend the daily 8:00 a.m. volunteer meeting and volunteer some of that time. If we all volunteer just two hours of time, the meet will be a great success. Many folks will be giving more time than that but if the general membership chips in just two hours a piece, what a huge difference it will make.

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Some of these volunteer jobs actually include running trains so don't be bashful, **VOLUNTEER!**

My parting shot for this issue is to remind all of you to bring some tools that can be used in case we have a fire. These tools include, but are not limited to, shovels, hoes, and water jugs (gallon milk or juice jugs work terrific). If we all *Think Fire Safety*, we won't need to use these fire tools! Thank you!

2009 TRIENNIAL CHECK IN This is the procedure - Jeanne Meisser and Joyce Kludt

What to expect when you arrive and check in at the front gate at Train Mountain for the 2009 International Triennial:

All those that have pre-registered will be given their individual packet. Those of you not pre-registered will pay the appropriate fees, based on the number of people in their party and their length of stay. All attendees are required to sign individual release forms prior to receiving their information packet.

The packet will contain a Train Mountain Commemorative Program containing a schedule of events, a track map, Train Mountain Safety Rules, a listing of the committee chairmen, vendor ads, and lots more. Also included in your individual packet will be your name badges and parking permits. Those entering Train Mountain with train equipment will also be given a number for unloading their equipment, if there is a backup at the Crisp Yard unloading area. After unloading, you will be given the option of having a volunteer park your trailer or you may wish to park it yourself. All trailers will be parked adjacent to South Meadow. You will also be given your track assignment at the time of your unloading at Crisp Yard.

If you are planning to camp at Train Mountain during your stay, you will be given a copy of the camping rules and asked to complete an emergency contact form.

If you are bringing a dog to Train Mountain, you will also be given a copy of the dog rules. Bring dog & vaccination records

All engineers and conductors are required to view a short safety video to be shown in Central Station. After watching the video, those engineers and conductors will receive a sticker on their name badge. The sticker signifies to the volunteers at the Inspec-

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tion Station that you are cleared to operate your equipment on the track at Train Mountain. No sticker, no running!

The Registration Desk at the Main Gate will be open on Sunday, June 21 from 1PM to 5PM and from 8AM to 5PM each day of the Triennial.

Be patient we will get you in and having fun as quick as possible!
