
How's the Triennial shaping up so far?

On Track

Things are sure slowing down. Most of the members have gone back to their warm homes and their day jobs, the steady stream of visitors has slowed down, and the mornings are getting cooler. I am still trying to get track work done, and will continue working until the ground freezes. We'll just have to wait and see what kind of winter we have.

Ron Domoe helped do some root removal work at the beginning of this month, and I feel I should take this opportunity to talk a little about our frustrating effort to remove a single root.

We set out to take care of a nasty root, just at the exit to the K&W yard. The root was right at a track panel joint, so of course we had to pull two track panels out of the ground. The root was easily located and cut out, the ballast shoveled back and the two panels were set back in place. Ballast was shoveled back, the panels were leveled and tamped and that should have been that.


Ron pointed out that the adjacent track was also raised from the same root, except this time it was under a switch, so we removed the switch, removed the root, replaced the switch, reballasted and leveled and tamped. That short description does not in any way explain the amount of work removing and replacing a switch is. Switches are hard!

I was feeling good about our progress, when Ron again noticed that the *third* adjacent track was also raised by the same root! This time we got lucky and the root crossed in the middle of the track panel, so that was a simple remove, de-root and replace.

And sure enough, the root also extended under the fourth adjacent track, which required two panels to be removed.

So what started out as a trip out to remove a root under a piece of track turned into removing and replacing six panels of track and a switch, all to claim we removed a single root! It is never easy.

I have also been working on a track update down near G-ville. I will keep you in suspense by waiting until next month to give the details.



Fulton RR 4-4-0 Locomotive with Tender and 2 Passenger cars \$32,500 USD *Price reduced!*






2022 Triennial Video Now Available



Please use ARIAL 12pt font—it can be displayed in all Browsers, and is easy to read. Please do NOT use the Calibri or Times New Roman font, as we must take the time to convert it to Arial.

If your document has an embedded image, you must also include the image separately as a jpg, png, or similar image file.

Visitors to Train Mountain and YOU:

Train Mountain is very popular and is continually attracting visitors from throughout the world. We announce that our hours are from 9:00 AM until 3:00 PM Monday through Friday during the summer, and 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM during the winter. The office is closed on weekends except during meets, and then only when volunteers are available to open the office.

Our insurance advisors request that all people (members and visitors) complete and sign a liability release. If **YOU** as a member encounter visitors on the property without a visitors pass please direct them to the office so that we can insure that a release has been completed and a visitors pass has been issued.

If **YOU**, as a member, open the gate and allow visitors to pass through - **YOU** are responsible to see that the release has been completed, and **YOU** are liable for them until they sign a release. Releases are available in the mailboxes near the office for those times when the office is closed. There are also releases available in the kitchen and in the Back Shop.

If you do not want to, or do not have the time to, ensure that the releases are completed - then please graciously explain that the train park is closed to visitors and that the open hours are normally (Winter - 10:00 AM until 2:00 PM) (Summer - 9:00 AM until 3:00 PM) Monday through Friday. To arrange other hours visitors should call the office at 541-783-3030.

Train Mountain is a NO SMOKING Facility

During recent events, many Members and their Guests have been ignoring this policy. There are only three designated smoking areas at Train Mountain:

(1) Outside the front of the Backshop

- (2) Outside the east door of the Hall of Flags
- (3) Outside the Motor Pool (Maintenance Building)

Due to the high fire danger at Train Mountain during the summer, we have zero tolerance for anyone smoking outside one of the designated areas.

There is NO SMOKING anywhere out on the track!

Members, Guests, and Visitors that continue to violate the Train Mountain Smoking Policy may be asked to leave.
