March finds us looking forward to Spring. Many things are happening at Train Mountain which need hard work from our faithful volunteers. First, the **Kitsap Live Steamers Work Week is April 10th thru 17th**. Followed by the **Spring Awakening Meet, May 1st to 9th**. These work weeks will allow us to get the track cleaned and back into service. There will be continued work on the **Timber Lake replacement track** as only 1 of many needed projects to prep TM for the 2022 Triennial.

Dale Furseth has volunteered to lead the "Screw the Yard" project which will take place during the Narrow-Gauge Work Week starting May 22nd. However, we still need a volunteer coordinator for that Meet to oversee all the volunteer work projects. Please contact me or the office if you are interested in this position. It is a great way to gain experience for the Triennial.

During the Pandemic, the **TMRR Board has been meeting** in various alternative methods such as online, by e-mail and small in-person meetings. This has been a learning experience for us all. Announcement of our meetings and agendas have not been published to general membership. However, efforts have been made to keep the **Board's Minutes up to date on the Web site**. I will begin maintaining a list of **e-mails for members who want to be notified of the meetings and the agendas**. In some cases, the meetings will be on GoToMeeting or Zoom. When we can use the Library again, we will use the conference call, as we did a few years ago. If you wish to be on this **notification list please e-mail me** and in the **subject** block enter "Be notified of TMRR Board Meetings". I will then provide the meetings ID's and passwords or other information to you. My email is oldcatd399@hotmail.com.

Currently, **Klamath County has been rated "Moderate" for Covid-19** risk. This allows us to **hold outdoor meetings** up to 150 people. This will still require social distancing and face masks. These are **similar procedures** to those used **during the meets held last year**. Because of cleaning and monitoring requirements, we will not be able to use the Central Station building for group meetings and will not be able to use the kitchen. Upon any **changes** to these restrictions, we **will make announcements** regarding them. Please be aware that these restrictions can go either way as situations within the pandemic change.

When Covid restrictions rescind, we can expect a lot of pent-up desire to engage in travel and outdoor activities. When we once again host day visitors, we look forward to resuming Tour trains. For the tour trains, we will need volunteer train crews again as well. We now have three locomotives that have been converted to electric for this use. All volunteer engineers must be checked out on the operation of these engines. For any who might be concerned, TMI has Liability Insurance coverage. Your membership in TMRR also makes you a member of Train Mountain Institute. When operating tour trains, you are acting as an agent of TMI. If you wish to review TMI Insurance policies, please see Joyce in the Business office while at Train Mountain. This review can only be done in person, at the Office.

The **OPS** committee is looking for a **design** to put **on a button** for the **best preforming crews**. This button will be made on the equipment in the Office and if you are interested, please **contact Richard Croll** or myself. Speaking of the OPS Meet, be on the lookout for more TM Gazette Articles on this subject. Once ground conditions allow, re-grading of the Jones Tunnel Track will be completed. The **Jones Tunnel failed and was caving in**, which required its removal. The lower track will follow the original route while the upper track has yet to be moved to the North this spring.

This year will require a lot of work get accomplished. So be prepared and **make your plans to come to Train Mountain soon**. Join in on the fun as it will be a **great way to cure cabin fever**.

Rail Tours 2021 Edition

Once the snow is gone or it warms up a little (which ever comes first) we will be back giving our much requested (and needed) Rail Tours. A Rail Tour is just that, a multi stop Tour of the railroad with a docent(s) **explaining** a little bit about what is at each of the Rail Tour stops. Listed below is a brief description of the role we the members play in the bigger picture of this thing we call Train Mountain:

<u>Train Mountain Institute</u> (TMI) owns Train Mountain and operates it for educational purposes. In order to do this function TMI provides both the railroad and safe and tested Rail Tour equipment.

Train Mountain Institute educates the public using our Museum Docent members. The membership provides *TRAINED* docents to give these tours on a daily basis Monday through Friday, weather dependent.

Notice I stated that TMI will train docents to give these tours this year. Russ, David, Dale and Tom have designed a certification procedure. The reason for this certification system is that it is for legal and insurance reasons. Our tours hope to be hauling more and more public we just need to cover our exposure to liability

There are Two parts of the Rail Tour system. First there is the Meet and Greet side, which will be called the *Visitor Center* function, which has been up to now a Front Office function. We need to embark on



the task of recruiting Meet and Greeters to man the *Visitor Center* Office when the weather gets better and the crowds come back. They will be responsible for getting releases signed and for the showing of a new Rail Tour video similar to, but a shorter version of our standard safety video. If this is a function you or your spouse would like to help us with please contact Joyce and she will get you signed up. This function needs to be manned from 10 to 3 daily, Monday thru Friday during the season. If no docents are available this

function reverts back to the Front Office, which is already stretched to its limit. So any help is really a double bonus. Volunteering for an hour or two or on a specific day like Thursdays for an example would be most beneficial.

The second *Rail Tour Function* is of course the *Engineers* and *Conductors* who will actually run the trains and give the tours. The tours are fun to do and only take an hour or so to give. If this is something you think you might want to do then please contact Tom, Dave, Dale or Russ and let us know. That will start the ball rolling. The main thing to remember is that these are Rail Tours *not* train rides. You will be *TALKING* with the public about trains, Train Mountain, and answering their questions. If we treat them good they reward us with donations. Donations help keep our membership dues low and keep all of the other functions that TMI provides running smoothly. So here's the deal, we really need more docents, we will give you the training necessary, and TMI provides the equipment. How cool is that!



Dale has got the TMI equipment operational for the upcoming season. All of the three seat Tour cars now have working brakes and the Tour locomotives have the necessary compressors and tanks for this task. We thank Dale for giving of his time and of course his expertise. Dale will do the training on the locomotives and will sign for part of your certificate. Russ will train the talking tour portion of the process and will be the second signature for your certificate!

We want Safe operation, happy visitors, and of course we want to have some fun running some trains.

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What's Happening in the Track Shop an article by Dennis Ward—Track Superintendent

The Track Shop crew exhausted most of the inventory of track supplies since the first of the year. But, there is good news. Our inventory of tie material has been updated, our steel rail recently arrived on the east coast and I've been told our tie plate order is ready for pickup.

We have prepared a pallet load of ties and installed them in the jigs in anticipation of the arrival of the rail later this month. As soon as the snow is cleared from the Willamette Pass I will go to Springfield to pick up the tie plates and production of track for the upcoming season will continue.

In the meantime Charlie 'Bill' Schubert and I have built or rebuilt several 75' radius (#9 frog) switches which are going to be needed to complete all of the summer projects. When Dustin Barnes left for new employment, with Knife River in Medford, I was concerned about getting the switch frogs welded. Thankfully, Dale Furseth took on the task and has performed admirably. All the frogs he has welded up fit perfectly into our jigs and the switches are great.

I am learning to operate the milling machine and have learned how to use the Bert Newberry built jig for milling switch points and closure rails.

We, the Track Shop crew and track installation crew, are all looking forward to a very productive 2021 track upgrading season.

2021 Train Mountain Operations Meet - June 19-27

It is time to make plans to attend the Train Mountain 2021 Operations Meet. Hopefully, things will have continued to open as the Covid 19 Pandemic seems to be winding down. As the committee continues with the planning, we will make whatever adjustments are necessary to ensure the safety of our members and still enjoy a successful meet.

The Operations meet is when Train Mountain Railroad simulates a real working railroad. There will be passenger trains running on a timetable and making stops to pickup and deliver simulated passengers. Freight cars will be delivered to various industries and other spots all over the railroad by means of printed switch lists. This is done by means of members signing up on a Motive Power and Crew Assignment Form. Generally, a crew will sign up once and keep their "Train Number" for the meet on the freight side. Recognition will be given for the most productive passenger crew, freight crew and steam powered freight crew. Individuals are free to work with more than one crew. For individuals that attend that are not part of a group or crew, we will endeavor to get them attached to a crew.

The Operations meet is a wonderful way to learn the Train Mountain Railroad. You can participate on Passenger Trains, Freight Trains, or if you just want to run during the meet, you can become an Excursion Train. We do ask that anyone running on the railroad during the meet have a train number so the Dispatcher can keep track of you.

The tentative schedule for this year is as follows:

Work Week Saturday, June 19 through Wednesday, June 23

- Monday- gather and inspect cars
- Tuesday-continue inspection and sort cars
- Wednesday-spot cars to their initial location
- Wednesday evening-Ops meet briefings and Signal Seminar

Operation Meet Thursday, June 24 through Sunday, June 27.

- Thursday-begin operations
- Friday and Saturday-continue operations
- Sunday-gather up and return cars to owners and storage locations

As usual, there will be a general briefing at 8:30 each morning. Location will be determined later, and they may also be available via Zoom.

We need volunteers as usual to do the various work week tasks. There are also positions during the meet for helpers in the Freight and Passenger Office, Dispatcher Office, and Tower. Experience is not required in any of these, and we will be happy to train volunteers.

Members freight cars are always welcome. They do need to go through the inspection, which primarily checks coupler function and

safety chains. Remember, safety chains go on the rear of the car. They must have quick links, not carabiners. Cars should be available for inspection by Wednesday, June 23. Every effort will be made to have cars back in the main yard by noon Sunday. If you do plan to contribute one or more cars, please let Jim Armstrong know the details of the cars as soon as possible so he can add them to the data base. His email is Armstrong.jandg@gmail.com. Be sure to include reporting marks (railroad name), car number and type of car, or a photo of the car(s) with the reporting marks in the picture would be even better.

The Operations Meet has always been one of the most popular activities at Train Mountain. Please join us for several days of camaraderie, fun and challenges.

The TrainGame is coming to Train Mountain Steve Eddy

This the first of a series of articles sharing the design, development and implementation of the TMRR **TrainGame**. Each article will briefly discuss the current status of the project and then I will try to delve deeper into one or two items of interest or questions to share.

First of all, my name is Steve Eddy, my wife Lindsay and I joined Train Mountain about three years ago and some say that I never left. I do live in Minden, NV, however, with the internet and all this working remotely, I guess I really haven't left. Most of the year, you can usually find me living off-grid in South Meadows. I am retired from the Telecomm industry where I worked primarily on computer systems development.

So what is this TrainGame? It is one of those systems that were designed on a cocktail napkin. Nathan McConnell, a TM member, created the tracking mechanism so that we can see on a computer screen where the trains are in real time. It is an elegant combination of GPS and radio communications technology combined with a computer server to organize and share the data.

"So Nathan, what if we put one of those trackers in a whole bunch of train cars and then built a computer system to dispatch them to TM members and run them all over Train Mountain?" I asked. That is all it took and the **TrainGame** was created.

Now what we are doing in concept is nothing new and has been done in glorious fashion at Train Mountain for years. We just thought it would be nice to be able to do this at any time and completely automated. Now

that we are going to be dispatching tasks to TM folks to move trains why can't we also dispatch tasks to do Maintenance Of Way like picking up pine needles or fixing track? And, we can even dispatch folks to maintain the TrainGame cars, sidings, etc. The game sort of fixes itself.

Why is it called a game? For starters, it a bunch of players moving game tokens around the world's largest game board. Next we define a monetary system like Monopoly. We call it TG\$ (TrainGame Dollars). The TG\$ is what is paid to anyone that completes a "Task" in the TrainGame. TG\$ are also paid to people that own cars that are moved as part of the TG. These people are call "Investors" and these people can persuade "Rail Operators" to move their cars by offering incentives in the form of TG\$. Since the cars that are moved usually are done so between "industries" then the controllers of those industries also make TG\$ for every car that comes and goes in their "industry". These people are called "Magnates". So these are the first three "Roles" that can be played by anyone in the TrainGame. It is a game and it is all about fortune and glory. Stick around and see how you can play.

Before I jump into this month's main topic I would like to invite you to come to the **TrainGame** Project Website. It is a blog type site to share the progress and design strategy of the **TrainGame** development. Please visit often, the goal is to keep it continually updated with current information. It can be reached at https://traingame.desertsagesolutions.com. We hope to hear from you on the web site and maybe you can join in and help us out.

This month's topic comes from the Project Website and discusses the sensitive issue of the **TrainGame** infringing or conflicting with the TMRR Ops Meet.

Is the TrainGame like the Ops Meet? ... Not Hardly.

For anyone that has participated in an Ops Meet at Train Mountain or any of the other clubs for that matter, they have had the opportunity to see layouts at their best with cars on all the sidings and trains everywhere moving those cars here and there. For the operators and crew it is a challenge

of logistics, stamina and teamwork resulting in sheer fun. The winners of those meets are of course everyone that participated. But the best teams standout with their well-designed hand signals, whistles and specific job definitions with nothing left out. Like a well-honed tool. The dispatch functions, radio communications and special operations add additional challenges for the team as it simulates a level of realism to the train operations. By far my favorite event at Train Mountain.

I have found no way to provide a full time operations environment to come close to the scale and grandeur of the Ops Meet. The level of dedication by many volunteer workers spending hundreds of hours cannot be maintained for more than a few precious days a year.

The evolution of the Ops Meet at TM has brought out some of the sharpest people to design and build some of the coolest systems to make this place work. The real work to make a system like the TrainGame even possible has been developed over many years by John Cooper, Jim Armstrong, and Nathan McConnell, and a number of other bright people that I have not met. My job is much easier because of the foundation that the TM pioneers have built.

Can we create an environment that supports a fleet of cars on the tracks, provides tasks to complete while operating our trains and at the same time stimulates the growth, maintenance and management of our layout? We are attempting to build a system that provides the essence of operations combined with the application of technology, lots of cooperation and comradery. The only thing I can see that the TrainGame could impact on the Ops Meet is to possibly make the teams better by offering a practice ground.

Next month we will discuss the different ways to play the **TrainGame**. The goal is to allow anyone to play anytime their way.




2018 Triennial Video Now Available


