On Track Dale Furseth

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This month started with the development of a plan to rebuild the switches around the turn table. Coming off the turn table raised tracks, each track butts up to a 3 way switch. The switches were pulling away from the turn table making for a difficult gap to bridge - in some of the tracks it was as much as a 1 1/2" gap. There are 24 switches that need to be rebuilt, so this will take a while. I will be writing about progress on these switches for a while! The first few that I rebuilt are taking about 4 hours each. Hopefully I will get faster.

At the end of March, Matt Thomas gathered up his Wonder Bread Crew and they came up to help on a number of projects on my list. They started the week by helping to re-lay the sidings in the coal mine yard, which now looks better than it has in years. There was almost 500 feet of track in this project. You may remember that I rebuilt the switches at the entrance to the mine last month so the coal mine complex is in good shape and is now open for business!

Next, a couple of new sidings were created with access to power near the west end of the containers.



Then, the approaches to 4 way road crossing needed to be dug out and re-leveled.

Next, the new siding at Midway was tuned and ballasted, so that project is now complete. For the record, that siding is now called "Ediger Siding".

Then, a day was spent in the track shop building a bunch of aluminum track panels that would be used on the next project.



Finally, they helped replace the Cucamonga siding with the brand new aluminum on plastic track panels with old wooden panels. I could have sworn the plastic track panels were so new, that they still had that "new panel smell".

And a new member was voted in to the Wonder Bread Crew. Richard Cox rescued one of the WonderKids trucks that had become stuck in a soggy spot. Many thanks go to Richard, and we hope he appreciates all his new Wonder Bread Crew bling!!

If you are at home saying, "Gosh, that sounds like a lot of fun. How can I get some of that?".

It is very easy! A bunch of really important and difficult projects were crossed off the list this month that absolutely had to be completed before the Triennial. I really appreciate the help.









Train Mountain Legacy Locomotives

This full-sized Air Force Baldwin S-12 locomotive is pictured at Ogden Air Force Logistics Center, UT. Locomotives 1863 and its sister 1864 were operated from 1961 into 2007. The AF utilized 56 such locomotives at many AF bases nationwide. At Hill, these two were used to





move oversized missile motors, aircraft parts, heavy equipment, supplies, munitions, and fuel utilized by the Air Force at Hill AFB

and Ogden AF Logistics Center. They interchanged with UPRR in the Ogden yards.

In 2008, TM member LTC Frank Bartholomew, USAF Ret., acquired two Trainworks 1/8" scale locomotives and had both detailed and painted duplicating the AF's S-12s at Hill AFB. Although the AF locomotives were scrapped in 2015, the scale USAF S-12s still operate today at Train Mountain moving equipment and people around the park showcasing the US military's railroad equipment of years past.







It is finally warming up and more sunny skies are appearing. There are still a few scattered rains, but overall it is looking like Spring is arriving.

The daffodils at Train Mountain are starting to sprout their nice green leaves and a variety of birds are chirping and singing.

Visitors to Train Mountain and YOU

Train Mountain is very popular and is continually attracting visitors from throughout the world. We announce that our hours are from 9:00 AM until 3:00 PM Monday through Friday during the summer, and 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM during the winter. The office is closed on weekends except during meets, and then only when volunteers are available to open the office.

Our insurance advisors request that all people (members and visitors) complete and sign a liability release. If **YOU** as a member encounter visitors on the property without a visitors pass please direct them to the office so that we can insure that a release has been completed and a visitors pass has been issued.

If **YOU**, as a member, open the gate and allow visitors to pass through - **YOU** are responsible to see that the release has been completed, and **YOU** are liable for them until they sign a release. Releases are available in the mailbox near the office for those times when the office is closed. There are also releases available in the kitchen and in the Back Shop.

If you do not want to, or do not have the time to, ensure that the releases are completed - then please graciously explain that the train park is closed to visitors and that the open hours are normally (Winter - 10:00 AM until 2:00 PM, Monday through Friday) (Summer - 9:00 AM until 3:00 PM, 7 days a week.) To arrange other hours visitors should call the office at 541-783-3030.

New Gate Code

Due to security concerns, the Gate Code for the Train Mountain Main Gate may be changed at any time without notice. Any Member planning to arrive at Train Mountain when the Office is closed will need to contact the Office prior to arrival to ensure they have the current Gate Code.
